Q: If there's not enough food for all the students what do you do?

A: "I always have butter sandwiches, and I'm never allowed to run out of food. Every child must be fed."

Q: If there's extra food what do you do with it?

A: "I throw it away, but if there is extra fruits like oranges, I keep the for the next day."

Q: Do you eat the school lunch?

A: "Yes, a lot of times, and fresh fruit is my favorite."

Q: Does the school lunch come frozen or fresh? A: "Both."

Q: Who makes the school lunch?

A: "Me (Mrs. Patty), Ms. Carolyn, and Ayana. We make them daily, twice a day."

Q: How long does it take to make breakfast? Lunch?

A: Breakfast: 6:30-7:30 am Lunch: 9:30 am- 12 pm. We are always busy.

Q: Where does the district order all the food?

A: "Not exactly sure, but we try to order only local foods."

Q: Who makes the menu?

A: " Central Kitchen."

Q: What happens to those students who have food allergies? What do you provide for them?

A: "We send a form home so their doctor can sign it and tell what the student is allergic to. We just give them the things they can eat."

Q: Why do students need to take food from the salad bar?

A: "Because we need to be compliant with federal guidelines in order to get paid for each meal a student takes. One requirement is that they eat healthy vegetables and fruits."

Q: I saw some people taking pictures of our sharing cart, will the district ask other schools to do that too? Or will they not?

A: "Adults aren't allowed to take from the sharing cart, only students, so they were evaluating or deciding if we should have a share cart and what should happen to that food after lunch."

After talking to Mrs. Patty (our lunch manager) about where our lunches come from, I was quite shocked about some of her lunches. Though I'm curious, what's your favorite school lunch food?
