Did you know that pandas have excellent camouflage, and have eyes that are different from normal bears? Panda cubs are well protected in their first month of birth. For food, bamboo is critical to their diet. Pandas eat almost entirely on bamboo, eating from 26 to 84 pounds per day and spend from 10-16 hours of their days eating!

Most giant pandas are native to China. It has a black and white coat that features large black patches around its eyes. Pandas are also an endangered species with only about 1,800 of them left in the wild. A Giant Panda cub weighs only around 150 grams (5 oz) at birth, while male adult Giant Pandas, weigh up to 150kg (330 lb). Pandas live on high mountains filled with large bamboo forests. The mountainous areas are present in a few of China's provinces, but the majority of pandas live in Sichuan Province, nicknamed, "The Home of the Giant Pandas." Pandas didn't always live in mountains. They once lived in the low areas of China but agriculture (farming and raising animals) and other building developments forced the Giant Pandas to live up in the mountains. **Election Day** by: Priscilla Zarate


